# Japanese Language Education at Rikkyo

#### 1. Center for Japanese Language Education (C J L E)

(1) Rikkyo University established the Center for Japanese Language Education (CJLE) in 2011 to enhance the Japanese language education for all the international students who study at Rikkyo. The Rikkyo Japanese language course is offered by the CJLE.

### 2. CJLE Japanese language course

(1) The Japanese language course offered by the CJLE is designed to provide students with language proficiency in Japanese attained in a natural and balanced context. Therefore, if you were unable to use Japanese appropriately and smoothly or forgot the knowledge acquired in the past, you might be placed in a level not desirable for you. However, when you work hard in the classes in which you have been placed, your proficiency will improve rapidly.

### Japanese Language Courses

#### 1. Course period

(1) Courses are offered in two periods: first semester and second semester.

(2) Each semester starts on the date below.

First semester: April 10 (Wed), 2013 Second semester: September 21 (Sat), 2013

#### 4. Class absences

(1) You may not be exempted from attending classes except in the case you have contracted a disease designated by the school to be infectious. (There is no other system of "authorized absence".) (2) In the event that you have contracted a disease designated under the School Health Law as a Class 1 or Class 2 school infectious disease, you are required to stop attending school and immediately contact the academic administration office below.

#### 5. Makeup Classes

(1) Makeup classes are not held for Japanese language courses.

### 6. Class protocols

- (1) You are required to be on time to classes. You are also required to attend all classes and activities.
- (2) You have to inform the instructors beforehand if you will be late or absent from class. If you know you will be late or absent from class on that day, e-mail your instructors or inform them through your classmates.
- (3) You should turn off your mobile phone/cell phone or turn it on silent mode during class.
- (4) Food is not allowed except for items like cough drops with permission from the instructor. You may drink bottled tea or water. Soda and any canned drinks are also not permitted.
- (5) You should use only Japanese in the classroom.

# Japanese Language Course Registration

## 1. Japanese language classes/levels/eligibility

(1) The Japanese language classes are divided into nine levels, from J0 up to J8. Students are allocated to specific levels based exclusively on the Rikkyo Japanese Language Placement Test.

Class/Level	Standard of eligibility to attend each level
30	Designed for students who have no prior learning experience in Japanese and want to learn daily-life Japanese expression and vocabulary.
J1·J1S	Designed for students who have no prior learning experience in Japanese but can read/write Hiragana and Katakana or those who have prior experience with only a limited knowledge (not yet mastered basic conjugations of verbs and adjectives or vocabulary of less than 500 words, etc.).
J2 · J2S	Designed for students who have a very basic knowledge of Japanese (basic conjugations of verbs and adjectives and a vocabulary of 500 words).
J3 · J3S	Designed for students who have already mastered the first half of fundamental sentence structure and a fundamental vocabulary (about 1000 words).
J4	Designed for students who can communicate with friends, or who can deal with well-known topics in Japanese.
J5	Designed for students who can deal with everyday situations in Japanese.
J6	Designed for students with average daily Japanese comprehension. Students can read magazines or newspapers by using a dictionary, and write their opinion in appropriate Japanese.
37	Designed for students who can express their opinion about politics, economics, international affairs, and so on in high-level Japanese. Students can read magazines or newspapers without using a dictionary, and write their opinion in appropriate, sophisticated Japanese.
J8	Designed for students who have mastered a high level of grammar, Kanji and vocabulary and are also able to study or do research in Japanese.

(2) Besides the classes listed above, students can study Japanese culture and society in English using Japanese as a "tool" through the classes shown below.

Class	Eligibility
Japanese Language and Japanese Culture	Japanese language ability is not required
Seminar on Japanese Language and Culture 1 (Animation, Song in Japan)	For J2, J2S students
Seminar on Japanese Language and Culture 2 (Movie, Manga in Japan)	For J3, J3S students
Seminar on Japanese Language and Culture 3 (Novel, Poem in Japan)	For J4, J 5 students

#### 2. Japanese language placement test

- (1) To register for Japanese language courses, you have to take the Japanese Placement Test. You will be tested on grammar, reading, writing and speaking ability. Students with little or no prior learning experience in Japanese will be tested on *Hiragana*, *Katakana* and speaking only.
  - \* Returning students are given a written test only.

#### 3. Credit (unit) system of Japanese language course

(1) The credit system of Japanese language course is as follows. In regards to credits for each course, refer to page 21 - 24.

Hours	Credits
Japanese language course (90 minutes per week for a 15 week semester)	1 credit
Japanese language course (3 classes * 90 minutes per week for a 15 week semester) * J0, J1S, J2S and J3S are included.	3 credits

### 4. Notes on Japanese language course registration

- (1) Students cannot take or audit classes in any other level, except the one in which they are placed.
- (2) The course level cannot be changed in the middle of the semester.
- (3) J1-J3 and J1S-J3S have a different speed of progression. However, those classes have the same attainment targets.
- (4) J1-J3 students take all 5 classes per week because those classes are coordinated together.
- (5) J0 and J1S-J3S students have to take classes 3 times a week.
- (6) Please understand that you might be placed in J1-J3 according to the placement test results, even if you expected to be placed in J1S-J3S.
- (7) Students who are J4 and higher take the respective level of courses according to the placement test results.

- (8) For J1 and J1S, classes are conducted mainly in English. As classes progress, instructions in Japanese will be gradually added.
- (9) Eligible students can take "Intermediate Japanese A" and "Intermediate Japanese B" simultaneously.
- (10) Eligible students can take "Intermediate Japanese C" and "Intermediate Japanese D" simultaneously.
- (11) Eligible students can take "Intermediate Japanese A-D" and J4, J5, J6 courses simultaneously.
- (12) To register "Business Japanese Oral 2", acquisition of credits from "Business Japanese Oral 1" is required.

### 5. Japanese language course registration procedure

(1) You need to complete and submit the Registration Form (A). Further details are given in the Course Registration Orientation.

# Grading for Japanese Language Course

### 1. Grading for Japanese language course

- (1) Your performance in the Japanese language course is graded on attendance, participation, in-class tests, quizzes, assignments, etc. Examinations are not given during the regular exam period at the end of each semester. In regards to evaluation for each course, refer to each syllabus.
- (2) The evaluation criteria are shown below.\* Your grade for a course of which you have taken credits may not be cancelled.<Grade / Evaluation criteria>



#### 1. Classroom labels


(1) Classrooms numbers consist of 4 digits. The meaning of the digits is explained below.

### Emergency guidelines for a Major Earthquake Warning Alert

In the case that the National Earthquake Assessment Committee for Areas under Intensified Measures against Earthquake Disaster \* has been convened in accordance with the Special Measures Law on Earthquake Disaster Prevention, all classes are cancelled and the following steps should be taken.

- (1) Please stay at home. If en route to the University do not come to the University.
- (2) If you are at the University, comply with communications and instructions from the University.
- (3) The procedure for resuming classes once the warning alert has been cancelled is put into effect as follows:
  - ① If the warning alert is cancelled before 5:00 am, classes will be conducted as usual.
  - ② If the warning alert is cancelled before 9:00 am, morning classes are cancelled and normal classes will begin in the afternoon.
  - ③ If the warning alert is not cancelled before 9:00 am, classes for the entire day are cancelled. In this event, no University business (including administrative business) will be conducted.

\*The Earthquake Assessment Committee for Areas under Intensified Measures against Earthquake Disaster: This is an assessment committee, convened at the request of the Director – General of the Meteorological Agency, that makes assessments regarding the risk of a major earthquake in areas designated as being subject to intensified measures against earthquake disaster under Article 3, Clause 1 of the Special Measures Law on Earthquake Disaster Prevention.

#### Emergency guidelines for Approaching Typhoon warning

Classes may be cancelled due to some special conditions such as an approaching typhoon. For details of the special measures, check the University website or notices, or phone the office.
